Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Our objective is to improve the life chances of all young people who attend Carshalton Boys Sports College. The focus of our pupil premium strategy has been to support this work through improving teaching and learning, providing universal access to technology outside of the classroom, reviewing and improving the quality of SEND provision and improving the attendance of our disadvantaged young people who fall below our target of 96%.

By 2019, we had made progress in a number of these areas and we were closing the gap between disadvantaged and other pupils, however in 2019-20 the gap widened significantly, and although it reduced in 2020-21 it is still larger than it was pre-pandemic, and increased again after the return to exams in 2022. It is our view that disruption to learning caused by the pandemic was the significant contributing factor to this issue. In our plan for 2022-25 and beyond we are focusing on doing this through:

- Improving behaviour and reducing exclusions
- Improving attendance
- Ensuring that all pupils are able to read at a level that will enable to access an age appropriate curriculum
- Providing high quality tuition to support those whose outcomes are below expectations
- Improving teaching & learning, with a focus on ensuring that there is appropriate challenge in all classes on the most able pupils
